#### **Business Items**

#### Call to Order

RCP Chair Troy Fischer called the meeting to order.

#### Attendance Roll Call

Principal Planner James Ruggieri read through the roll call and noted for the record the voting members that were in attendance.

#### Chair's Remarks

Chair Fischer welcomed everyone to the meeting.

#### **Adoption of Meeting Minutes**

In light of comments made by the members about streamlining the meeting process, Somerset County Planning Director Walter Lane asked if everyone was amenable to the idea of having staff distribute future Treasurer Reports to the members for review in advance of the next meeting. Anyone who had any questions could raise them at the meeting; otherwise, if there were no issues, the Treasurer Report would be approved in an expeditious manner similar to how the minutes are approved. Everyone was in agreement with this approach.

#### **Public Comment Period**

There were no public comments concerning the Action items on the agenda.

#### **Action Items**

(Marketing Consultant Rich Reitman excused himself from the meeting before any discussion commenced about the Awarding of Year 2 of Competitive Contract for Principal Marketing Services and the Authorization to Release Request for Proposal to Upgrade Website agenda items.)

#### Awarding of Year 2 of Competitive Contract for Principal Marketing Services

Mr. Ruggieri shared that at the March 29, 2018 meeting, following a public bidding process to procure professional services, the Regional Center Partnership (RCP) awarded a 24-month Competitive Contract to The Reitman Group to provide principal marketing services at a rate of \$18,000 per year. These tasks include newsletters, preparation of the annual report, press releases, website maintenance, website analytics, etc. Mr. Reitman has fulfilled all the tasks. Mr. Ruggieri noted that the current contract (year 1) with Mr. Reitman ends March 20, 2019. Because the 24-month contract was awarded contingent on funding being available for year 2 pending adoption of the 2019 Budget and Work Plan, it is necessary to award a marketing contract for Year 2 (March 2019-March 2020) to provide the same marketing tasks services for a not to exceed amount of \$18,000. Staff shared this information with the Marketing Committee and Executive Committee and the recommendation is to award the contact to The Reitman Group. Mr. Ruggieri noted that, if there are no objections, the recommendation is to award the contract to The Reitman Group to perform the same principal marketing tasks for a not to exceed amount of \$18,000.

There being no discussion, Chair Fischer asked for a motion to award the Year 2 of Competitive Contract for Principal Marketing Services to The Reitman Group for a not to exceed amount of \$18,000. The motion was made by Raritan Mayor Chuck McMullin and seconded by Somerset County Park Commission Deputy Director/Leisure Services Cindie Sullivan.

#### Authorization to Release Request For Proposal to Upgrade Website

Mr. Ruggieri distributed copies of a final draft scope of work (SOW) and summarized the work tasks to be performed to upgrade the website. The tasks include upgrading the website with a Content Management System, designing the website to be mobile responsive and visually more attractive, migrating the contents from the old to the new website, maintaining email communication capabilities, and providing on-site training and technical support. The not to exceed amount is \$15,000. The objective is to release the Request For Proposals (RFP) in time to receive and evaluate proposals in order to make a recommendation to award a contract at the May 15 meeting.

Some discussion followed. Chair Fischer noted the current website is very old and no longer supported by current technology. The hosting platform was recently upgraded to a more modern platform hosted by GoDaddy. Mr. Ruggieri added that the SOW reflects input provided by the Executive Committee.

There being no further discussion, Chair Fischer asked for a motion to authorize staff to release the RFP to upgrade the website for a not to exceed amount of \$15,000; Bridgewater Township Local private/institutional sector representative James Franco moved and Somerville Planning Board Vice-Chair Lisa Werner seconded the motion.

## Somerset County Business Partnership Request to Extend and Expand Grant Agreement for Strategic Economic Development Activities

Included in everyone's meeting packet was a letter from the Somerset County Business Partnership dated March 7, 2019 requesting the RCP to consider extending and expanding the Strategic Economic Development Activities grant agreement to allow the Business Partnership to pursue the recommendations outlined in the report *The Suburban Disadvantage: An Overview of the Grow NJ Program* (the "Suburban Disadvantage report").

Mr. Lane gave an overview regarding the work undertaken over the past few months in relation to the "Suburban Disadvantage" issues of the Grow NJ program. In December RCP set aside funding for Strategic Activities in anticipation that new legislation would likely have to be created to facilitate a reform of the Grow NJ program. Since then a lot has been happening at the state level. Governor Phil Murphy issued a scathing report about the Grow NJ program in his State of the State address and the legislature has been holding hearings about the Grow NJ program. In light of all this, Somerset County Business Partnership President & CEO Mike Kerwin, Somerset County Business Partnership Vice-President for Economic Development John Maddocks, Chair Fischer and Mr. Lane have had discussions and the Executive Committee met on March 13 to review a proposal by the Business Partnership to extend the previous grant to enable the Business Partnership to undertake a "Phase 2" of the Strategic Economic Development Activities work.

Mr. Kerwin reported on the first Grow NJ legislative hearing held March 8 which he, Raritan Mayor Chuck McMullin and Chair Fischer attended. Mr. Kerwin noted that the legislators now understand that 90% of the state's 565 municipalities are subject to the same "suburban disadvantage" issue and that the law governing Grow NJ is not operating as originally envisioned by the legislators. Mr. Kerwin also reported about his participation in a National Association for Industrial Office Parks (NAIOP) jury session which provided important feedback by members of the development community in relation to the role Grow NJ has had in certain projects. Mr. Kerwin concluded his remarks by noting that, in light of the impending June 30, 2019 Grow NJ expiration date and how things are transpiring at the state level, the Business Partnership is proposing to retain the professional services of the Murphy Partners who can bring the level of expertise on legislative reform to the attention of the legislators to give areas of New Jersey like the Regional Center and Somerset County a more equal opportunity when applying for state economic development incentives.

Mr. Maddocks described how Grow NJ has greatly benefited the Regional Center and Somerset County by helping retain over 4,000 jobs. He noted the positive feedback from many legislators in raising awareness of the suburban disadvantage issues. He also noted the Grow NJ program should not overlook transformative areas like designated redevelopment areas, Main Street Districts, designated Centers of Place, and Planning Areas 1 and 2 as per the State Development and Redevelopment Plan all of which exist in the Regional Center.

Following additional input from several RCP members, Mr. Lane noted that the grant request is for \$30,000 which, if approved, would be committed out of the funding previously allocated for Strategic Activities.

(At this point in the meeting Mr. Kerwin and Mr. Maddocks excused themselves from this portion of the meeting and did not participate in any action involving the grant request.)

Discussion followed. Mr. Lane noted the structure of the pending grant agreement would be similar to the previous grant agreement except that, unlike the first grant agreement, an allowance for reimbursement for administrative fees are not included in the pending grant agreement.

At the conclusion of the discussion, Chair Fischer asked for a motion to extend and expand the Strategic Economic Development Activities grant agreement with the Somerset County Business Partnership by committing up to \$30,000 to be made available to the Somerset County Business Partnership to pursue the recommendations outlined in the *Suburban Disadvantage* report; the motion was made by Mr. Navatto and seconded by Ms. Werner.

#### Phase 2 Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Grant Proposals

Mr. Lane noted that funding was previously set aside for Phase 2 Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Challenge Grants. The grant applications were released and three (3) proposals were received and shared with the Executive Committee. Raritan is applying for the full \$15,000 to update the Borough's Circulation Plan Element with a Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan. Raritan's' proposal is consistent with the recommendations of the Regional Center Strategic Plan, the County's work for Supporting Priority Investment in Somerset County, and complements the County's Walk Bike Hike study. In light of this, the Executive Committee recommends approving Raritan's grant proposal. Somerville is applying for the full \$15,000 to install either two (2) or four (4) permanent high-visibility pedestrian signs at designated locations along West Main Street. The actual number of signs will depend on pricing and NJ Department of Transportation requirements. The Executive Committee recommends approving Somerville's grant proposal. Bridgewater is requesting the full \$15,000 to prepare a township-wide Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Travel Plan which considers the entire township. Having a Bicycle and Pedestrian Travel Plan in place will allow Bridgewater to apply for Safe Routes to School funding. Staff discussed the proposal with the Executive Committee noting that the proposal is consistent with the Regional Center Strategic Plan which discusses interconnecting the Regional Center with the rest of Bridgewater Township; in light of the foregoing, the Executive Committee recommends approving Bridgewater's grant proposal.

Chair Fischer asked if any of the mayors had any comments. Somerville Mayor Dennis Sullivan noted the importance of enhancing pedestrian safety in the downtown especially given the increasing number of pedestrians visiting the downtown amidst heavy volumes of vehicular traffic. Bridgewater Mayor Dan Hayes noted the Township has been working with the County on bicycle routes and appreciates the opportunity to prepare a Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Travel Plan in light of the Township's plans to pursue Safe Routes to School funding. Raritan Mayor McMullin noted the Borough's efforts to enhance bicycle and pedestrian safety and town-wide interconnectedness, adding that the Borough is working with Johnson & Johnson to interconnect with J&J's internal walkway system.

There being no further comments, Chair Fischer asked for a motion to approve the Phase 2 Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Grant proposals; the motion was made by Ms. Werner and seconded by Mr. Navatto.

Some brief discussion followed. Chair Fischer noted he thought the Challenge Grant applications were excellent proposals especially in regard to the importance of helping people reach the Regional Center.

#### **Information Items**

#### Resilient NJ - Funding Availability for Program Support

Mr. Lane described a potential funding opportunity through the Resilient NJ program Administered through the NJ Department of Environmental Protection, the Resilient NJ Program provides funding and technical assistance to multi-municipal regions in the counties of New Jersey most impacted by Superstorm Sandy. Though the Regional Center is not eligible to apply in the current funding round, staff will keep an eye out for potential funding in the next round which is supposed to make funding available to "non-Sandy" counties to undertake similar resiliency projects. Mr. Lane briefly described the types of eligible projects; e.g., making infrastructure more flood-resilient. In light of how the Regional Center Strategic Plan discusses resiliency there could be an opportunity to pursue a multi-municipal resiliency project in the Regional Center.

#### **Marketing Update**

Mr. Reitman reported that he worked with staff to finish and distribute the January and March newsletters and has begun work on the May Newsletter and the 2018 Annual Achievements Report. He continues to provide staff the weekly Analytics reports and continues to grow his newsletter distribution list. He issued a press release about the RCP starting off strong in 2019 which has gotten some press coverage. Mr. Reitman also put together a Regional Center ad for the Somerville St. Patrick's Day Parade journal and is currently researching other community events that provide journals which the RCP could possibly help support financially similar to the St. Patrick's parade ad.

Mayor McMullin suggested that perhaps an interview with the press could be arranged involving Chair Fischer, Mr. Kerwin and Mr. Maddocks to highlight the Grow N J issues to get more common press on this matter. Mr. Reitman noted he can arrange the interview.

#### **Municipal and Other Reports:**

Raritan Mayor McMullin reported Janssen Pharmaceutica is reinvesting in Raritan at their corporate complex. On Route 202 the building without the roof has been replaced with a new building to be occupied by 7-Eleven. There has been no progress with the owner of the vacant Stop & Shop. On February 2 about 40 people including representatives of Somerset County government attended the Raritan Borough Wayfinding and

Streetscape Improvement Workshop. Mayor McMullin noted the Borough is contemplating making part of Thompson Avenue and Anderson Street one-way as part of a larger circulation effort to help connect people from all of Raritan's neighborhoods and the train station to downtown, Duke Farms, John F. Kennedy School, Borough parks and Duke Island Park as well as making bicycle and pedestrian linkages with the corporate centers in town. The Borough is very appreciative of the County and RCP support for Raritan's bicycle and pedestrian safety enhancement efforts throughout the entire town.

Somerville Mayor Sullivan shared that he is hopeful the proposed Brewpub will open soon despite apparent delays resolving certain brewery license requirements required by the state. The SOMA apartments on South Bridge Street have nearly all been rented. The developer of the SOMA project has shown interest in looking at other potential areas in town to develop. The proposed Somerset Station project at the train station is moving along very well and will feature a variety of residential units. Mayor Sullivan thanked his predecessors for their work to help the Borough reach a tax appeal settlement with RWJUH Somerset; from the settlement the Borough will receive approximately \$2.5 million in voluntary payments for a five-year period.

Bridgewater Mayor Dan Hayes reported that the continuing life care project on Frontier Road is under construction. The developer of the proposed Bridgewater Hills project on Frontier Road hopes to have a public hearing in April. Also the two existing office buildings on Frontier Road will be the subject of a subdivision to create a separate lot. On Route 22 at Morgan Lane the Bridgewater Choice mixed-use project proposes to develop a vacant lot into a hotel and a Goddard School. In the Bridgewater Promenade shopping center the former Golfsmith store is proposed to be filled with a yet-to-be-named specialty grocery store.

#### **Somerset County Planning Board**

Mr. Lane noted that on April 30 the Somerset County Planning Board will be hosting the annual Somerset County Land Development and Planning Awards ceremony. Mr. Lane described the details about the event.

Mr. Lane reported that in January he, Mr. Maddocks, Mayor McMullin and Raritan Borough Planner Angela Knowles spoke about the Somerset County Investment Framework and the Somerset County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) at the New Jersey Planning Conference hosted by the New Jersey Chapter of the American Planning Association. Mr. Lane noted the attendees were very impressed with Somerset County's work demonstrating a remarkable level of coordination between the County and the towns and between the public and private sectors.

#### **Somerset County Business Partnership**

Mr. Kerwin reported the Business Partnership is about to finish the report *Somerset County: Embracing Diversity and Inclusion* which is a resource that summarizes what a business operating in Somerset County "needs to know" about our growing diversity. The report includes a breakdown of data by municipality. The report can be viewed on the Business Partnership's website at <a href="https://www.scbp.org/diversity-inclusion">https://www.scbp.org/diversity-inclusion</a>. Mr. Kerwin thanked the Somerset County Planning Division for providing great demographic data for the report.

Dear Troy,

Thank you for your confidence in the Somerset County Business Partnership Foundation, Inc. as we engaged in an analysis of the impacts of the Grow NJ program on the Somerset County Regional Center and Somerset County as a whole.

With roughly three months remaining until expiration of existing business incentives, the time is upon us to act decisively. Therefore, we are requesting an extension and expansion of our original grant terms and conditions.

Our initial strategy of understanding how Grow NJ has, and has not, benefitted our region in anticipation of new or revised business incentives legislation at the state level has proven beneficial.

Our September 13, 2018 presentation at a combined meeting of the Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders and Somerset County Regional Center Board of Trustees concluded our initial obligations under the terms of our original grant agreement.

Since that time the Somerset County Business Partnership has invested significant time and effort in following through on our original tactical implementation objectives. These efforts included meetings with Senate President Steve Sweeney, Senators Bob Smith, Christopher Bateman, and Tom Kean, as well as Assemblymen Freiman, Zwicker, and DiMaio.

We have also communicated our requests for removal of the 90 percent limiter in Grow NJ, advocated for continued business retention incentives, and sought recognition of designated areas in need of redevelopment as priorities in new or revised business incentives legislation.

## Somerville Phase 2 Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Challenge Grant –Permanent High Visibility Pedestrian Signage Improvements along Main Street

#### **Project Summary**

Under Phase One of the RCP Challenge Grant for Pedestrian Safety Enhancement the Borough installed many pedestrian signs in the school district to greatly help with pedestrian safety. For Phase 2 the Borough is focusing on Main Street which has a history of pedestrian accidents. Of the five (5) uncontrolled crosswalks on the most heavily travelled section of Main Street, the Borough has targeted addressing the two highest priority crosswalks—West Main at Union Street (first priority) and the midblock crosswalk at Giardina Alley (second priority). Grant funding would be utilized to purchase four (4) permanent high-visibility pedestrian signage ("Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons") with two (2) signs installed at each intersection. Each set of two signs will activate in unison when a button is pushed to stop cars in both directions.

Because West Main Street is under NJDOT jurisdiction (NJ28), the Borough is awaiting a decision from NJDOT to see if NJDOT will allow the Borough to utilize the same type of pedestrian signage the Borough used on Borough streets at the schools which is less costly to install. If NJDOT does not allow that type of signage within their right-of-way then the Borough will have no choice but to go with the

signage allowed by DOT which has costlier construction requirements such that the grant funding will only cover 2 such signs. In light of this, the Borough has submitted two (2) budget scenarios for either 4 or 2 signs depending on the decision by NJDOT.

For the educational component of the grant the Borough Police Department will partner with RideWise to provide in-school education relative to bike and pedestrian safety.

#### **Project Summary:**

Raritan Borough has a vision to become a truly walkable, bikeable, and pedestrian-friendly community, while recognizing the fact that the town sees over 100,000 vehicle trips per day. The Borough is situated at the crossroads of Routes 206, 202 and 28 and many use the town as a cutthrough to these major roadways. The Borough recognizes an opportunity to harness this activity and capitalize on the traffic to help revitalize the main street (Somerset Street). Through this effort we want to ensure that residents and visitors who choose to walk and/or bicycle around town are at the forefront of the revitalization effort.

The town has a Circulation Plan Element of the Master Plan, (adopted in 2003), a Complete Streets policy (2011) and a Wayfinding Plan (2014) and while some recommendations from those plans have been implemented using NJDOT and CDBG funding, the Borough lacks a comprehensive strategy for linking existing sidewalks and paths and for developing new linkages and new opportunities for crosswalks, traffic calming, bike lanes, shared travel lanes, and other important features to move people safely through the town. An update to the circulation plan element will restate the vision for safe pedestrian and bicycle movement through the town and to nearby trail networks; it will offer recommendations for improvements to existing infrastructure and construction of new infrastructure where needed; and will provide the comprehensive strategy for mobility of all modes of transportation for the entire town.

There are many factors in and around the Borough that suggests this is an opportune time for Raritan to engage in such a project, aside from the Borough currently engaging in bicycle and pedestrian safety programs:

- 1. Somerset County is preparing a Walk-Bike-Hike Plan that will link county trails, paths, and greenways to each other and to more regional trail systems. The Borough and the County have a close partnership on projects that promote public health and safety and support a wider network of circulation planning.
- 2. The Borough has a strong desire to connect neighborhoods north of Route 202 to neighborhoods south of Route 202 and ultimately give all Raritan residents easy and safe access to the train, the downtown, all of the town's schools and churches, and the river.
- 3. Since the opening of the "North Gate" at Duke Farms, Raritan Borough has a heightened interest in encouraging pedestrians and cyclists to utilize the pedestrian bridge on Nevius Street to access the riverfront on the Raritan side and for visitors at Duke Farms to cross

over and patronize the businesses on Somerset Street. Similarly on the western end of the Borough, access to Duke Island Park from the Woodmere neighborhood is an important connection across Old York Road.

4. The need to provide safe east/west Pedestrian and Bicycle passage to connect our JFK primary school and public pool on the west end of the Borough to residents, as well as the Frelinghuysen Park/public pool located on the east end of the Borough near Route 206 to residents.

It is for these reasons that Raritan Borough seeks to obtain funding from the Regional Center Partnership to prepare an update to the Circulation Plan Element of the Master Plan with a focus on Pedestrian and Bicycle safety.



#### **Regional Center Partnership Challenge Grant Program**

#### Phase 2 Pedestrian Safety Enhancement Challenge Grant

<u>Description Goal</u>: The proposed project will assist in making motorists more aware of and cause a stop for pedestrians in crosswalks on Main Street where we have high pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

#### **Detailed Description of Project:**

Under Phase One of the RCP grant last year the Borough of Somerville was able to install many pedestrian signs in the school district which was a great help to pedestrian safety. In this new Phase we would like to turn our attention to Main Street where we have had a history of pedestrian accidents. There are 5 uncontrolled crosswalks on the most well-travelled portions of Main Street Somerville including Main/Union, Main/Giardina Alley, Main/Maple, Main/Warren, Main/Grove.

Under this grant we would like to address two areas: 1.) the intersection of Main Street and Union St with second priority being 2.) the mid-block crosswalk at Giardina Alley.

We would like to install permanent high visibility pedestrian signage called Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) with a total of 4 signs 2 at each intersection. Each set of two will activate together in unison when a button activator is pushed to stop cars in both directions. What will determine if we can treat both intersection locations hinges on the outcome of an application to NJDOT. Being the locations are in the state right of way NJDOT may subject us to more expensive construction detail requirements. I am therefore presenting two budgets with scenario 1. Using a simple direct burial style installation and scenario 2. installing a full foundation. To fill out any remaining funding balance we would like to purchase temporary pedestrian warning signage. To satisfy the educational component of the grant the Somerville Police Department will partner with Ride Wise TMA to provide in-school education in the area of bike and pedestrian safety. The program will cover where and how to safely walk and ride to school and the dangers of distracted walking, cycling without a helmet and crossing mid-block. A pedestrian and bicycle safety power point presentation will be made to students at both the high school and middle school. The program will take place in August-September 2019 with an estimated project time of completion being fall of 2019.

In Phase 2 of this RCP grant request, the Borough is trying to further improve safety at two busy crosswalks which are particularly vulnerable to pedestrian accidents. The intersections of West Main Street/ Union Street and West Main Street/Giardina Alley see a considerable amount of foot and bicycle traffic due to popular stores and restaurants in the area, as well as being a main route for students to get to and from the Somerville Middle School (SMS) and Somerville High School (SHS). By installing Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) at the crosswalks, there is a potential to improve Main Street safety for all, including the children walking and biking to and from school.

In addition to the support of this grant application, the Somerville Board of Education will also work with the Borough to schedule educational sessions at SMS and SHS on pedestrian and bicycle safety.



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




# Task 1: Set Up Steering Committee Team and Key Contacts

The Alan M. Voorhees Transportation Center (VTC) Team (Leigh Ann Von Hagen and Sean Meehan), RideWise and Bridgewater Township will obtain some initial data and information from the community and identify a core team of representatives from the school district, local government, and interested agencies and organizations who will guide the process.

# Task 2: Gather Information on Existing Conditions and Policies

The VTC team, RideWise TMA and Bridgewater contacts will work together to collect basic information from the municipality and school district related to pedestrian and bicycle travel patterns and support for walking and bicycling to school, including:

# Information/data from schools/school districts:

- School catchment areas
- Student address (not including student names)
- School start and end times, school breakfast times, timing of any afterschool activities
- Policies related to student travel and school wellness
- Local travel data
  - o Schools will be asked to conduct student arrival and dismissal travel mode tallies. A survey will be provided to appropriate school personnel for completion over a consecutive three-day period.

o Each school administrator/principal will be asked to complete a brief survey to provide information that includes, but is not limited to, official and unofficial walking and bicycling to school routes and cut-throughs, existing walking and bicycling educational programming, and any safety incidents and concerns.

#### Information/data from municipalities:

- Crossing guard locations, hours of operation, and crossing guard training information
- Any traffic or speed studies available
- Current master plans and redevelopment plans
- Complete Streets or similar policies or ordinances
- Sidewalk maintenance and snow removal ordinances
- Any maps of bicycle infrastructure (lanes, parking, trails, etc.)

# Task 3: Hold Initial Steering Committee Meeting

The VTC team, RideWise TMA and Bridgewater staff will plan and execute a meeting involving all Steering Committee members and key partners. The VTC team will present initial demographics, mapping, and findings and make recommendations for next steps in additional data collection and conducting walk audits.

# Task 4: Conduct Analysis, Mapping and Identify Priority Corridors

Based upon project needs and data quality/availability, once initial data has been collected the VTC team will map several items including demographics, land use, existing infrastructure, key pedestrian and bicycle areas, pedestrian and bicycle crashes, student locations, and characteristics unique to the community.

#### Task 5: Conduct Audits

The VTC team, RideWise and Bridgewater staff will schedule walk and (potentially) bike audits based on feedback from identified priority areas. Audits involve observing how drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists interact with each other and the built environment (e.g., roads, sidewalks, intersections) and documenting unsafe behaviors or conditions.

# Task 6: Develop Draft Recommendations and Action Plan

Once countermeasures have been identified, the VTC team will develop an action plan that prioritizes actions in a series of three tables: municipal and school policy countermeasures; non-infrastructure countermeasures; and infrastructure countermeasures. These tables will be used to collect community feedback and prioritize countermeasures.

# Task 7: Engage Public for Community feedback

The VTC team and RideWise, with assistance from Bridgewater staff, will hold an open house/public event or participate as a part of a larger existing community event to identify the top priorities and needs with regards to walking, bicycling and general travel within Bridgewater. This interactive event will allow participants to provide feedback on walking and bicycling safety. The municipality and school district will be responsible for organizing and advertising the public engagement event.

# **Step 8: Draft Presentation**

The VTC team and RideWise will present the draft report to the full steering committee and invited guest. This meeting will highlight findings from the data collection, mapping, analysis and audits and present prioritized recommendations. The VTC team and RideWise will make updates based on feedback from this meeting and finalize the report. Before finalization, the report will also be shared for review and comment with NJDOT.

#### Step 9: Final Report

The VTC team and RideWise will circulate the final report to the full steering committee. The final Pedestrian and Bicycle Travel Plan will be added to the NJ Safe Routes to School website, *saferoutesnj.org*.

# Transit Industry Training Needs Assessment - National Transit Institute

The goals of this continuing project are to identify and assess the nationwide current and future training needs of the public transit industry. Researchers are conducting a combination of focus groups and individual interviews to gather information from local public agencies like municipalities who have received past Transportation Alternative Set-Aside and Safe Routes to School grants from NJDOT and from Departments of Transportation outside NJ to gather information about how to improve the federal grant process and the state's obligation rates.

Predictable is Preventable: Tracking Pedestrian Near-Miss Incidents. As part of a recent study to identify, and gather information on, a list of challenging school crossings, researchers surveyed municipal traffic safety officers (police) for information on school crossings that the officers considered most challenging for pedestrians. Survey respondents identified pedestrian near misses with vehicles as significantly more common experiences than pedestrian crashes with vehicles at crossings identified as challenging. Pedestrian crashes are relatively rare and may not be an effective predictor of future conflict at a crossing. Near-miss data may be more predictive of future pedestrian-vehicle conflict at certain locations, and can support efforts to prevent serious pedestrian injury or death at these locations.

Gender Differences in Youth Bicycling. Bicycling rates of males and females in the United States differ, but little is known about when or why these differences begin to occur. With demonstrated benefits for human health and the environment, bicycling should be experienced equally throughout the population. This paper explores gender differences in cycling in order to better understand when bicycling habits become established and how children ride

their bicycles on a day-to-day basis to assist researchers and advocates in their efforts to create infrastructure design, policy, training, and educational and encouragement programs.

Broadening Outreach Efforts of Safe Routes to School to Children with Disabilities. Encouraging children, including those with disabilities, to be physically active and participate in SRTS is a vital component of the program. Inclusion in SRTS may not only enable children with disabilities to achieve important health benefits but also they can gain independence by learning important life skills about safe walking and bicycling and build relationships with peers. Conducted interviews with key stakeholders in the disability community, performed a literature review and co-wrote the report. Findings included various strategies for successful inclusion of children with disabilities in SRTS activities. Planned, coordinated and conducted training to TMAs on broadening outreach of SRTS to students with disabilities within their service areas.

New Jersey Youth Bicycle Education Program. The goals of the pilot program included: educating children about how to ride safely and avoid injury in addition to how to safely share the road with motor vehicles and pedestrians; increasing bicycle helmet use; and educating children on how bicycling helps their health and the environment. The pilot program targeted fourth and fifth grade students and was offered through municipal or YMCA summer recreation programs, after-school programs, and school physical education classes in Camden, Pemberton, Hanover, and all of Hudson County, NJ. As part of the program, promotional materials were sent home with the children who were encouraged to discuss what they have learned with their families, effectively spreading the safety messages of the program to a wider audience. By bicycling properly and sharing what they learned, students who completed this course served as an example and an educator for their friends and families. This project was jointly funded by the NJ Department of Transportation and the NJ Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

School Crossings on State Highways. Pedestrian crossings on state highways in New Jersey are challenging to engineer for safety. It is important that state policy makers understand the risks associated with school children walking to school. Investigating the condition of school crossings on state highways is a priority for the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT). This report assesses the safety of school crossings on New Jersey state highways and provides guidance about possible areas for improvements. The six most troublesome intersections were examined in depth.

Safe Routes to NJ's Disadvantaged Urban Schools. This study details the NJ Department of Transportation's Urban Demonstration Program to understand why Safe Routes to School programs do not take hold as well and aims to empower inner city school communities with tools and strategies to overcome barriers to walking and bicycling to school by addressing the issues that are important to them.

Identifying and Addressing Fear, Perception and Risk Related to Walking and Bicycling to School. Declining physical activity for children has become grave enough to seize the attention of physicians, public health officials, parents, schools, planners, and policymakers, who are now seeking possible solutions. One of the ways children can obtain more physical activity is through active travel, primarily walking or bicycling to and from school. With the goal of improving both our understanding and interventions to increase currently low physical activity and active travel rates, this paper examines parental perceptions, how and why these perceptions form, and how they impact travel mode choice. Children's perceptions were also examined to better understand their perceptions of the built and social environment in regard to mode choice.

Middle School Student's Perceptions of Active Travel: A Mixed methods Analysis. Children's perceptions, particularly of safety, may be an important link to not only their present health and travel behaviors, but also their future health. Prepared and coordinated presentations to middle school students in Hudson County, NJ which included a visual

survey as well as structured interactive classroom discussions. This research examined middle school students' perceptions of safety and the built environment on their walk to school.

The Evolution of School Siting and its Implications for Active Transportation in New Jersey. This study examines historical changes in the size and location of schools in New Jersey and their relevance to children walking and bicycling to school. It compares the characteristics of schools, students, and surrounding areas of schools established in different decades to identify the critical issues that affect active transportation to school in the state.

Can I Bicycle to School? This research examined school policies on active travel in one county in New Jersey — Middlesex County. All 165 public schools in Middlesex County were contacted and surveyed to determine whether policies on active travel existed and collected specifics about the policies (grades affected, modes, etc.) The results of the surveys were compiled and summarized along with inferences based on the data and suggestions for changing and clarifying school policies.

Is it Safe to Walk to School? This research study reviews literature on risk perception and data from surveys that were distributed to parents throughout six public school in New Jersey. Questions comprising three main categories: (1) traffic dangers, (2) Social dangers (such as crime) and (3) child/community perceptions were included in the New Jersey Safe Routes to School Parent/Caregiver survey.

School Bicycle Parking Guide. School bicycle parking, particularly for elementary and middle-school students, requires additional considerations than for bike parking in other environments. Universally, bike parking should be secure, sheltered, easy to use, and have adequate capacity, but factors such as school location and riders' ages are important when determining the most appropriate type of bike rack. With younger students, for example, ease-of-use is especially crucial, while schools where large numbers of students arrive by bike may need to select high-capacity racks. This guide provides information to help schools make appropriate decisions when purchasing and installing racks.

Confronting School Bus Cuts. School districts throughout New Jersey are forced to make budget cuts, and transportation particularly courtesy busing which is not state funded, is usually targeted. As a result, school districts are reaching out for help with planning so students can safely walk and bike to school when busing is eliminated or reduced. Led and conducted interviews with school districts throughout New to collect information on cost reductions in school transportation, changes implemented, effects and reactions from the school community as well as steps taken once busing was reduced. Conducted interviews and wrote report that included strategies and recommendations are suggested when courtesy busing is reduced or eliminated.

Short Topical Papers. NJDOT often has a need to conduct research on critical issues as they emerge. Short topical papers are developed to research cutting edge ideas, find best practices in other states or countries, and/or prepare case studies. Recent papers include:

As a national leader in active transportation and addressing health and socio-economic disparities by developing sustainable transportation and land use solutions for communities, Ms. Von Hagen creates opportunities for practical

#### **NEW JERSEY CROSSING GUARD TRAINING & RESOURCES PROGRAM**

The NJ Crossing Guard Training & Resources Program provides research-based training and tools for crossing guards and the traffic safety officers who supervise them. School crossing guards assist children in crossing the roadways on their way to and from school, and they model appropriate street skills and behavior for young children. As part of the NJ Safe Routes to School Resource Center, the Crossing Guard Program prepares crossing guards for their duties and supports them through projects that address pedestrian safety.

New Jersey School Crossing Guard Training Manual and In-Person Training Program. Conducted research and developed a training manual and a uniform statewide Crossing Guard Training Program for municipal police traffic safety officers. The program provides guidance and policy on crossing guard training and supervision. To date, police from over 260 municipalities in New Jersey have received this training. This project was jointly funded by the NJ Department of Transportation and the NJ Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

New Jersey School Crossing Guard Research, More Than Crossing Streets. Crossing guards play a vital role in the lives of children who walk or bike to school each day. At the same time, the position of crossing guard is one of the most dangerous of NJ municipal jobs due to slips, trips, and falls, and crashes involving motor vehicles. Research and analysis included focus groups with school crossing guards covering work conditions in New Jersey and interviews with national experts to identify current best practices in use throughout the country. This project was jointly funded by the NJ Department of Transportation and the NJ Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

### PLANNING HEALTHY COMMUNITIES INITIATIVE

As a founder of the Planning Healthy Communities Initiative housed at the Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy, Ms. Von Hagen works to reconnect the disciplines of public health and community planning to combat health and equity challenges by conducting Health Impact Assessments (HIA) and by considering possible health and equity outcomes of decisions that might not ordinarily consider all impacts. Recent HIAs and Health in All Policy projects include:

Rutgers University Bike Share Health Impact Assessment. This project provided analysis of the health and equity impacts of the new bike share program planned for Rutgers and the three surrounding communities of New Brunswick, Highland Park, and Piscataway. The research highlights the existing bicycle use and transportation infrastructure with a focus on communities of concern and analyzes the physical, mental, social, and economic health impacts of the potential bike share program for users and residents, paying special attention to the needs of vulnerable subpopulations.

Middlesex Greenway Access Plan Health Impact Assessment. Analysis of and recommendations for mitigating health impacts associated with increasing access and utilization of the Greenway. Recommendations included addressing infrastructure, signage, crime, facilities and programming to best protect and promote health, focusing on providing benefits to populations that could benefit disproportionately, such as senior citizens and lower income populations.

Bloomfield Avenue Complete Streets Corridor Plan Health Impact Assessment. Analysis of and recommendations for mitigating health and equity impacts of a road diet including pedestrian, bicycle, transit and vehicle safety (crashes, injuries) and impacts to the local economy, air quality, crime, recreational opportunities (wellness/fitness), and specific impacts to vulnerable populations, such as minorities, the young, elderly and those with limited mobility.

Health Impact Assessment Continuing Education Training, Rutgers Office of Continuing Education. Ms. Von Hagen trains professionals in such fields as health, housing, transportation, energy, land use, environment, and education by teaching a process for projecting health and equity impacts and providing evidence-based recommendations to actively promote health, prevent diseases and/or injuries, and lead to economic benefits.

#### **SUSTAINABLE JERSEY**

As senior research staff to the former NJ Sustainable State Institute, Ms. Von Hagen facilitated the Mayors' Committee for a Green Future and the NJ Sustainable Communities Working Groups. In addition, she was responsible for creating resource documents, tools, process and incentives to create a set of criteria defining what New Jersey municipalities need to accomplish to be recognized as Sustainable Jersey communities. Currently Ms. Von Hagen leads the Land Use and Transportation Committee, develops actions for implementation, and is a reviewer of completed actions for Sustainable Jersey and Sustainable Jersey for Schools.
